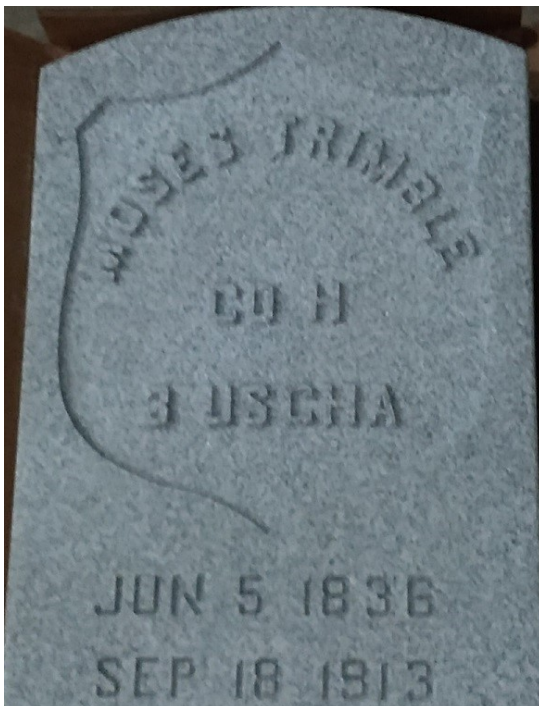

A STONE FOR MOSES TRIMBLE

Those who have read previous issues of Museum Muses will be familiar with the name of Moses Trimble. (For the complete story, you can access old issues of our newsletter on our website. The story appeared in the 2nd Quarter, 2018 issue. From our website, hover over "Newsletter" until "Newsletter Archive" appears, then click on that link to look for older newsletters.) For those of you who are new, Moses was born on June 5, 1836 in Highland County. Moses married Lucy Ann Elliott on October 3, 1856 and together they had twelve children.

We know from Wayne L. Snider's book, *All In The Same Spaceship*, that Moses served in Company H, 3rd Regiment, United States Colored Heavy Artillery, enlisting 25 Feb 1865, at 28 years of age. He was 5' 8" tall. He mustered out 27 Feb 1866. He is buried in a currently unmarked grave in Hillsboro Cemetery.

That will soon change, however, as with the assistance of Craig Turner, of Turner Funeral Home, and our local Vets Office, along with the U.S. Government, we have received a soldier's monument for Moses. When the weather again turns warm and concrete can be poured, through the generosity of Harsha Monument Co., it will be installed and our local Honor Guard will recognize the service of Moses Trimble. Watch for an announcement of this event.



RADIO STORIES REENACTMENT

Highland County Historical Society is holding a special fundraiser Friday, April 12 at 7:30 pm and again on Saturday, April 13 at 2:30 pm when three short radio dramas from *The Ohio Story* will be presented. Featured will be "Bells of Hillsboro"

about the C.S. Bell Company and Virginia Bell Thompson which originally aired Dec. 1, 1947. Mrs. Thompson also played a role in the formation of the Historical Society. Next up, will be "Ink on His Fingers" about Hillsboro's own Milton Caniff (original air date March 29, 1948). Finally, "Horse Collar Pad High School" about Edward Lee McClain and his start in business and his gift to Greenfield (original air date August 23, 1950).



Frank Siedel 1914-1988

Developed by Strongsville native and historian Frank Siedel, *The Ohio Story* aired three times per week from 1947 to 1967 in Akron, Cleveland, Columbus, Dayton, Youngstown, and Zanesville. These were short pieces about Ohio communities, events, and personalities, generally ten minutes in length, and were used to fill air time after a 20-minute news block. They were conversational history, bringing in current events and a lot of humor. The work garnered (continued on page 3)

biscuits, corn pudding, blueberry egg casserole, pastries and drinks.

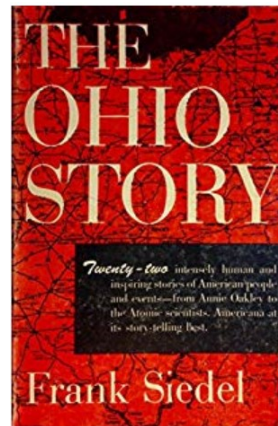

national as well as statewide attention and awards.

The Ohio Story scripts were donated by the author's son, Jonathan Seidel, Cleveland, Ohio, on 12 Aug 1996 to the Ohio Genealogical Society. In 2014, librarian Tom Neel applied for funding to digitize The Ohio Story holdings and was successful in receiving a \$2000 Ohio Archives Grant to be matched by the Ohio Genealogical Society. The Ohio Archives Grants are funded by the National Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC), an arm

of the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) through their State and National Archival Partnership (SNAP) Grants program. The funded projects include organizing and preserving historical records and cataloging and digitizing records for improved access.

MARGARET VAN FRANK
A Tribute

We honor and remember the contributions Margaret Van Frank made to HCHS. Margaret's life, which lasted from 01 Jul 1924 until 05 Nov 2018, was full and rich. She was elected director of Highland County Historical Society in 1994 and served there for 18 years. She did a lot to improve the overall décor of the museum and was responsible for several events, including the Children's Tea Party, the St. Patrick's Day Brunch, the Log Cabin Cookout and the publishing of the Highland County Pictorial History book.



Margaret was also active in the Republican Party, St. Mary's Catholic Church and the volunteer program at Highland District Hospital. She was elected to the Highland County Women's Hall of Fame.

It wasn't all work and no play for Margaret. She was a faithful fan of Cincinnati Bengals and also attended the

Masters Golf Tournament for 35 years.

Margaret is survived by her three sons—Rob, Rick and Roger, as well as a very special daughter-in-law, Connie, six grandchildren, four great grandchildren and one great-great grandchild.

Group Graduation Photos Wanted

We are creating a display of group graduation photos and need your help. I'm not sure when photographers stopped taking the group photos. I've seen one from 1947 but none later than that. I need photos where the school and graduates are identified. I want group graduation only, not class photos. Until the state ordered consolidation of schools in the 1960s, there were several smaller schools in the county that served individual communities. Let me know if you have a photo you can loan for the display.

Changes in 2019

The board members approved a slight increase in membership dues. The new dues are \$20 for individual

and \$30 for family. There has not been a dues increase for at least ten years. Dues are a major source of our revenue as we do not have a tax levy or receive any grants for maintenance or programs and events.

The Highland House will be open on Fridays and Saturdays from 1-4pm in 2019. Carolyn Hastings will be available on Friday afternoons to assist in research in the library and Jean Fawley will coordinate the volunteer greeters and shop clerks. We would like to be open another day but we need people to volunteer their time. It requires three people to open the museum – a greeter, a shop clerk and someone to oversee the library. Would you commit your time to three hours a week to help us better serve the community?

would inherit the farm was if he promised to keep it a working farm. That promise has been kept to this day.

According to Dr. Henry, in the 1840s, bricks baked in a kiln on the farm were used to build the farmhouse. In 1959, Henry graduated from Hillsboro High School and then attended podiatry college in Cleveland. Following graduation, he and his wife relocated to Oklahoma where he had a successful podiatry practice until his retirement.

According to local historic family farm ambassadors, Kathy and John Levo, the Henry farm marks the latest Highland County farm to be honored by inclusion in the program. Of over 14,000 farms in Ohio, only approximately 1,500 have been recognized by the state for continuous family ownership of at least 100 years. The Levos state the last agricultural census (2012) stated highland county had about 1,400 farms and it would be expected several of those could qualify for the program in either the 100, 150 or 200 year continuous family ownership levels. According to the Levos, the application process is rather simple and there is no charge to apply. NEW CENTURY FARM

Highland County Historical Society congratulates Dr. Thomas Henry on being honored by the Ohio Department of Agriculture for becoming the newest Highland County farm to enter the Ohio historical family farm program.

In 1903 Joseph Rittenhouse purchased an 88 acre farm on Rittenhouse Road in Paint Township. Upon his death, his daughter, Mary R. Sams inherited the farm. Later her husband Clarence purchased adjoining land to increase the farm to 140 acres. Following their deaths, the farm was passed to Susan Sams Henry, the mother of the present owner, Thomas Henry.

According to Dr. Henry, his mother told him the only way he

BARBERSHOP SINGING IN HIGHLAND COUNTY

Bob:

I always liked the sound of Barbershop harmony. I became acquainted with Gene Courts who was part of the Cincinnati Gateway chorus and also sang in a quartet. As we talked, he said that their chapter would be pleased to come, sing and explain how we could organize a local group. That soon happened and I found many men in Highland County who loved to sing.

Soon the chapter was formed and Hall Harvey, Hillsboro High School music director, was named the director. Our first big event was a production performed with 42 singers, at the Hillsboro High School Auditorium in 1975. We sold advertising, I put together a program booklet, others made arrangements for a quartet, "Gentlemen's Agreement" from Detroit, to be our headliner and we put on a great show to a packed auditorium.

Wes Dorsey came to Hillsboro with Hillsboro Manufacturing and he was an accomplished barbershopper with much experience, having sung in National Competition. He gave us encouragement and direction; however, over a peri-

od of time the group stopped meeting. I was never a good singer, unable to carry my part except when a strong lead was sitting beside me, but I enjoyed being a part of the group. I was a much better worker and supporter than a singer.

Wes Dorsey's wife, Pat, was instrumental in starting the local chapter of Sweet Adelines, for the women who also loved to sing barbershop. I did and still do like that four part sound of the barbershoppers! John:

As mentioned above, THE HIGHLANDERS began as an official chapter of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Shop Quartet Singing in America, or SPEBSQSA. Chapter Night was held with a big show on 17 May 1975. At the end of that show, Gene Courts, President of the Johnny Appleseed Division of SPEBSQSA presented the group's charger and The Highlanders were officially part of the organization.

Around 1939, O. C. Cash, a tax attorney in Oklahoma, along with fourteen friends,

started preserving the style of quartet singing and proposed SPEBSQSA and then incorporated it as a non-profit fraternal order. By 1976, membership in the organization numbered over 35,000.

The local chapter's first president was Marion Wilson and other board members included Phil Wilson, Bob Hodson, Hal Harvey, Lew Duncan, Roger Smith and Bob McMullen. Other members included Tom Archibald, Michael Blevins, Richard Bowman, John Bright, Lawrence Carson, Ted Dumbauld, E. W. Eggleston, Jay R. Harmount, Jay L. Harmount, Don Hastings, Mike Hays, Gordon Hixon, Robert Hodson, Carl Jacobs, Ivor Jones, J. Harold Lyle, Paul Orr, Ervin Pulse, F. W. Roberts, Bill Sanders, Dale Schraw, Ralph B. Smith, Robert Smith, Eldon Spencer, John

Steritz, Herb Turner, Hugh Turner, Grover West, Walter West, William West, Heber Wilkin, James Williams, Harold E. Wortman. (plus those men previously mentioned above.)
