They say that odors can trigger memories stored long ago in the brain to surface and recall an event or a place. The smell of leather in the summer when the harness shop had the door to the street open—the smell of fresh produce when one walked into Penquite's Grocery—the smell of Ports Drug Store with the mixture of cologne and cosmetics, of Reed's Drugs with their food service and of Ayres Drugs. Lang's Smokery had a unique smell: their food service, especially their wonderful coney, combined with the tobacco smells.

I have memories of what a beautiful and interesting building Merchants Bank used to be, of Kroger uptown and how proud they seemed to be of their employee who was the queen of the Sesqui-Centennial (I believe that was Helen Ross). I remember uptown restaurants: the Maroy, the Skyscraper, the Chatterbox and the old original Magee's. I well remember Ellis Furniture Store as it was owned by my stepfather.

"We Sell Health" was the slogan for Swonger Dairy, while the Tummy Treat exclaimed, "Don't be snooty, eat with Pearl and Cootie" when it was owned by the Wilkins. I miss the old bike shop on S. West Street,

right behind Pasquale's when it was located at the corner of S. West and W. Main Streets. Uncle Al and Wanda came to town to help with Pasquale's Grand Opening.

Banyas Buick and Highland Ford were located right uptown and Matson Chevrolet was close by. You had to drive out W. Main Street to get to the dealer who sold Studebakers. But it was all worth it when the new model year arrived with those new cars shrouded until the big day came for them to be revealed; the experience made more special with free coffee and doughnuts!

Being a town kid, I didn't have a lot of use for Farmer's Exchange, but I was always fascinated by the pedestrian bridge from the W. Main sidewalk over to the building.

Beside Kroger and Penquite's, one could buy groceries at Schaeffer's, Lowe's, Steen's, Creed's, Gabriel's and later, Royal Blue, and all uptown. If you didn't mind the extra block or two, you could always shop at Alber's, Harshbarger's, Bumgardner's or Murphy's grocery stores.

Hillsboro Bank & Savings was entered from a door on the corner (there's just a window there now). At

Farmer's & Trader's Bank building, there were three entrances—one went into the bank, one into Columbus & Southern Ohio Electric Co and the third to a set of steps leading up to offices on the second floor.

Who was up there? McMullen & McMullen Law Office, Donald Fender Realty, Highland County Acceptance Co (where my mother worked), Davis Law Office and Wilson Law Office. Shirley Lovett (now Shonkwiler) worked for Dick Davis. My mom used to tell the story of the time they crawled out the window of Shirley's office and climbed down the fire escape to go to Magee's for a cup of coffee.

Do you remember the Easter Egg Hunts held in the grassy area between the Highland County Library (in the Scott House) and Hillsboro High School? I never found a gold or silver egg, but they were worth the big bucks! Another age group of kids hunted eggs on the west side of the high school. During those years, the school driveway entered the property from the light at Oak Street and ran beside the building (the gym had not been enlarged yet) and around to the back of the building to the parking lot. (The rear addition had not yet been built either.) West of the driveway

was a grassy area where the egg hunt was held for children of this age group.

I well remember going to Kaufman Bargain Store when it came time for new school clothes. We always bought blue jeans long in the fall and rolled them up, then as I grew, they were rolled up less and less. The store was in the Bell's Opera House building. If I remember correctly, there were seats from the opera house for folks to sit in to try on shoes at Kaufman's. Speaking of shoes, remember Boltz & Haggerty Shoes? They had a machine that enabled you to see your foot inside the shoes. The last time I was in that building, the machine was still in the back room.
