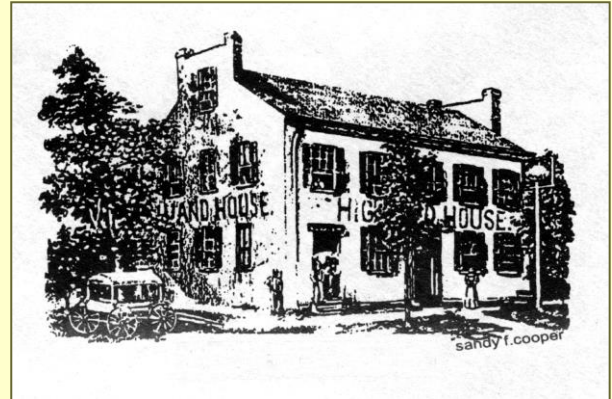

Nellie Collins and Her Piano

One of the newest acquisitions of Highland County Historical Society is a square rosewood grand piano purchased from Mary Brown Turner, through the generosity of many persons interested in preserving a piece of Highland County history.

The piano had for many years been used in the Wesleyan Methodist Church, now known as A Place For Grace, located at the corner of N. East and E. North Streets. The piano belonged to Minnie Hudson, having been given to her by members of the Collins family for whom she worked.

The piano was originally purchased by Charles H. Collins in Cincinnati in 1974 for \$835.00 from the D. H. Baldwin Company for his daughter, Mary Ellen, affectionately known as Nellie by family members. The piano was manufactured by Decker Bros., of New York City. After acquisition of the church building, Mrs. Turner arranged for restoration of the instrument by Gary Beeker of Cincinnati.

Nellie was born at Bethel, Clermont County, Ohio, the daughter of Charles H. and Mary Ellen Tice Collins on July 12, 1864. The attending physician was Dr. William Ellsberry. Nellie was baptized at the Hillsborough Methodist Church on August 28, 1964.

Nellie attended the Highland Institute for young ladies and graduated from the Hillsborough Female Academy. She spent time traveling with her father, including a trip to Europe in 1883, accompanied by her great-uncle Frank and Aunt Margaret Trimble Armstrong and their daughter, Mary Ann.

On Christmas Day of 1889, Nellie was married to Fred Fitch, son of Colonel and Mrs. Fred Fitch of



Pueblo, Colorado. The wedding was held at the Collins home at 134 E. South Street with the Rev. James Murray, pastor of the Methodist Church in Hillsborough performing the ceremony.

Nellie was dressed in a corded white silk dress, point lace veil (the family history of which added value to its intrinsic richness), diamonds (the groom's gift to his bride), and white tea roses (also a gift from the groom) tied with graceful loops of white ribbon.

Miss Florence Fitch, sister of the groom was maid of honor. She wore a dress of cream cashmere with cardinal silk trimmings. The groom and his best man, Mr. John Collins, wore the conventional full-dress black suits.

Money, a handsome house, completely furnished in Pueblo, a new life for the young couple set in a western atmosphere, love and admiration by her new family: all the things for a happy life together. But this was not to be the case. By the end of the 19th Century, the marriage had ended in divorce court and Nellie had returned to Hillsboro and taken back her maiden name.

Nellie Collins died June 7, 1929 and rests in the Collins lot at Hillsboro Cemetery.
