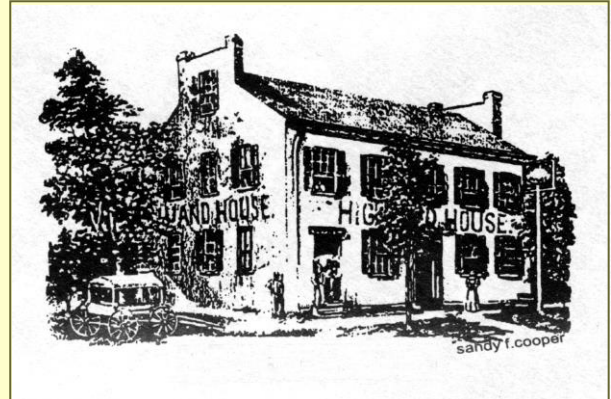

VOLUNTEERING IN THE UNITED STATES

About 61.8 million people, or 26.4% of the population volunteered through or for an organization at least once between September 2007 and September 2008. (Bureau of Labor Statistics). The volunteer rate of men was 23.2% and women, 29.4%. Women volunteered at a higher rate than did men across all age groups, educational levels, and other major demographic characteristics. Persons age 35 to 44 continued to be the most likely to volunteer (31.3%), while persons in their early twenties were the least likely (18.6%). The only group with a significant change was the 16-19 year olds whose rate rose 1.4%, essentially offsetting the 1.9% decrease that occurred in the prior year. Individuals with higher levels of educational attainment volunteered at higher rates than those with less education. Among persons age 25 and over, 42.2% of college graduates volunteered, compared with 18.1% of high school graduates and 9.4% of those with less than a high school diploma.

The number of hours volunteered during the year was 61,803. Comparing data from previous years, however, we find in the year ending September 2005, 65,357 hours of volunteering!

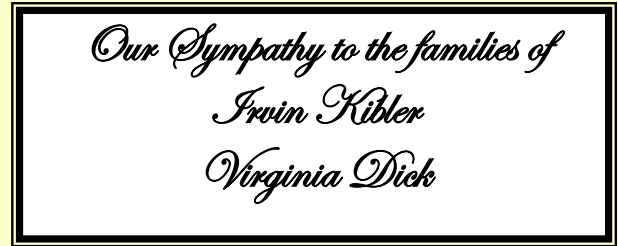
Located in the meeting room at the Highland House Museum in Hillsboro is a two position switchboard, the last cord board used in Highland County. It had been installed on the second floor of the Ohio Bell Telephone Company building on West Beech Street in 1959 by Western Electric.

The ten position switchboard had been previously used in an Ohio Bell office in Northern Ohio before coming to Hillsboro. The positions were refinished by my future husband, Lester and his father, Bert Wallis, with the help of Dean Hill, who was at the time in charge of the Sherwin-Williams paint store in Hillsboro. Dean mixed the finishes in the various colors used in refinishing the switchboards.

The switchboards were used for the next twenty years (1979) by a number of telephone operators including myself.

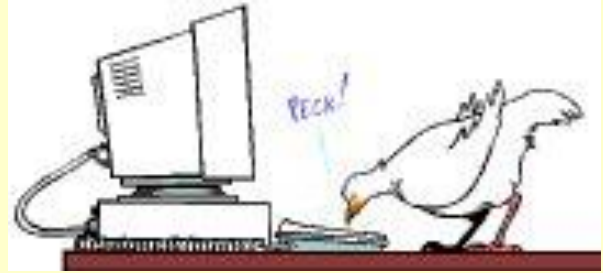

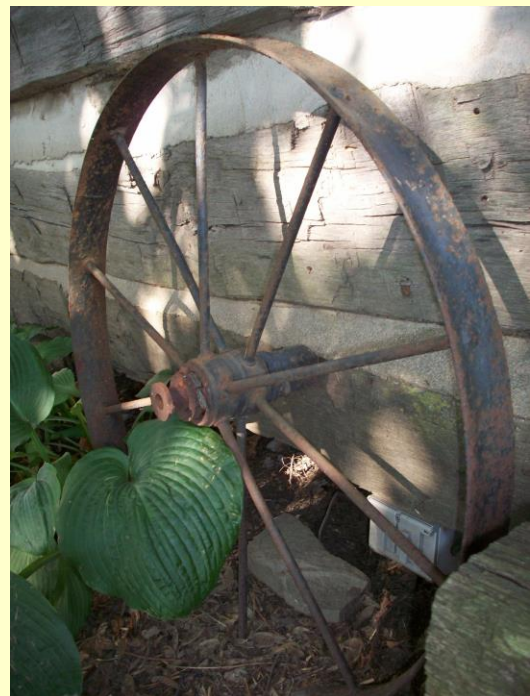
