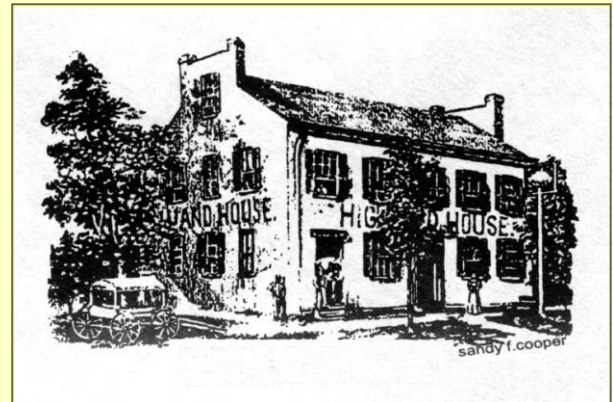
A Note from Your President

LAST CALL – The Rise and Fall of Prohibition

Few of us are not familiar with Ken Burns and the documentaries he creates for PBS, such as “BASEBALL” and “JAZZ” just to name a couple. His ability to tell the story, intertwining fascinating film and still photos with narrative keep us glued to “the tube” on each night of the presentation. Now he is working on the story of PROHIBITION and will be featuring “LAST CALL – THE RISE AND FALL OF PROHIBITION” in it. This 376 page book (not including extensive notes, appendices and indices) is a fascinating portrait of an era and a very entertaining tale.

Many feel that our current time must be the most troubling when we consider the amount of alcohol

consumed by adults and youth. However, once the statistics are understood, it is easier to understand the great uprising of the prohibition movement. (The sailing vessel that brought John Winthrop to the new world in 1630 actually carried more beer than water!)

With Hillsboro's prominence in the rise of the prohibition movement, a handsome amount of space in this book is devoted to the events occurring in our town. With the upcoming reenactment of these events, the reader would be well-served to do his homework to learn how we fit into the entire movement toward PROHIBITION.

What else did they do?

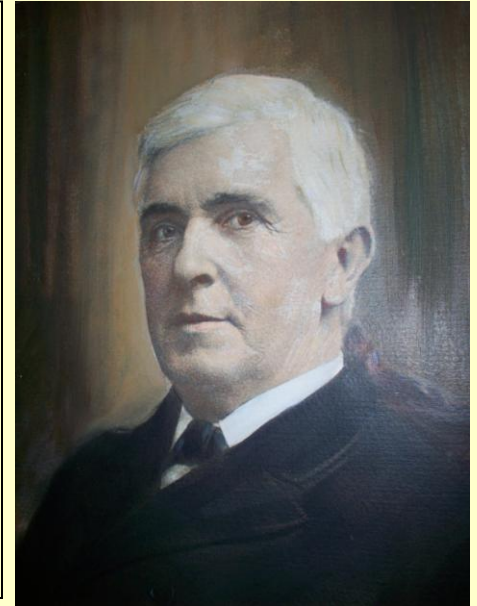

What else did they do? (take the quiz on page 3 first!)

- A. -9 Called the “Angel of the Battlefield” during the Civil War, Clara Barton was a schoolteacher for 18 years and a clerk in the U.S. Patent Office.
- B. -6 His wife and mother were both deaf and Bell was a speech therapist for the deaf. His invention of the telephone stemmed from his search for a device to help his students.
- C. -10 Nellie Bly was the pen name of Elizabeth Seaman, a pioneer woman reporter, however, as a traveler she bested Jules Verne’s hero by going around the world in 72 days, 6 hrs and 11 minutes in the winter of 1889-90.
- D. -3 Tennessean Davy Crockett, who died at the Alamo on March 6, 1836 was elected to Congress in 1827, 1829 and 1833.
- E. -8 Almost totally deaf, prolific inventor Thomas Edison was a successful musical recording producer. He once auditioned and harshly criticized pianist Sergei Rachmaninoff.
- F. -4 To help support his family while writing *The Scarlet Letter* Nathaniel Hawthorne had a 4 year appointment as surveyor of customs in Salem, MA.
- G. -7 “Shoot, if you must, this old grey head, But spare your country’s flag,” she said,” wrote John Greenleaf Whittier in 1864, immortalizing the courageous housewife, Barbara Frietchie.
- H. -1 At age 11, naval hero John Paul Jones became an actor with a Jamaica stock company. He also served as a rear admiral in the Russian navy.
- I. -2 Besides inventing the telegraph, Samuel Morse was a noted portrait artist, university professor and first president of the National Academy of Design.
- J. -5 You know him as a renowned silversmith, but Paul Revere also learned dentistry and replaced missing teeth. He also sold eyeglasses and established a mill to make copper sheathing for ships.
